


Nepal Coronavirus CivActs Campaign

In the present circumstances, it is a compulsion to perform final rituals of the deceased worker at the destination. The Foreign Employment Board Secretariat has requested close kin of the deceased to send a consent letter through the concerned District Administrative Office. The Council of Ministers has decided to provide Rs. 50,000 as a relief to the close kin who sent the letter.



Are you in Dubai or Qatar? Here is some important information for you to know.

Dubai: The public vehicles are operating in Dubai. In addition, tram is also under operation from today. Some suggestions from relevant bodies on the use of public vehicles under this circumstance:

- Reach the bus or metro station half an hour earlier than regular days.
- If the bus, metro or tram you are planning to take is crowded, then don't take it. Wait for another one.
- Keeping a distance of 2 meters with others in the station and the vehicle.
- Do not sit in the seats marked with a red symbol. Its objective is for people to maintain social distance.

Qatar: The money exchange and transfers which were closed in Qatar from past one month has reopened from yesterday. Here are some rules to be followed:

- Entering the exchange by wearing a mask.
- Maintaining a minimum of 2 meters of social distance.
- You are only allowed to enter after your body temperature is tested. So, not entering if you feel weak or even have a slight fever.
- As soon as you touch the cash clean your hands with sanitizer before it touches your face.
- Try to avoid touching the pole, walls, or the exchange counter. Take your

10 directions from the Commander in Chief for the army personnel designated for COVID-19 prevention, response and control



- 1. Protect yourself first to protect your family, community, and country.
- 2. Always maintain a social distance of more than 1.5 meters and highly maintain your personal hygiene.





- 3. If unwell, stay at home or in the barrack, conduct a test if necessary and stay in isolation maintaining a physical distance.
- 4. Only believe official and valid information.





- 5. Always have a supportive feeling for your colleagues. Understand the norms and values of the army and also share it with your colleagues.
- 6. Always be respectful to all the citizens. Highly respect the health workers who are working risking their lives.





- 7. Many citizens are assured with the presence of the army. Sick people feel well. Always present your integrity, gentleness, and humanity.
- 8. The lockdown imposed by the Nepal government is both challenge an opportunity for the country. Do not use your courage but your intellectuality. Forget your happiness and show your feelings for service.






- 9. Show restrainment and patience during this period. Always remember, difficult times are only for some time.

Status of COVID-19 among Nepali migrant workers



The above graph shows the status of COVID-19 among migrant workers in different destination countries. Poor living conditions, over-crowded settlements and lack of support from employers and governments of destination countries is keeping our workers at a higher risk of infection and mental stress. The government needs to be more aware of these workers and needs to act proactively in protecting all of them from the pandemic. Strong diplomatic interventions to protect them and impromptu initiatives bring them home safely is necessary.
